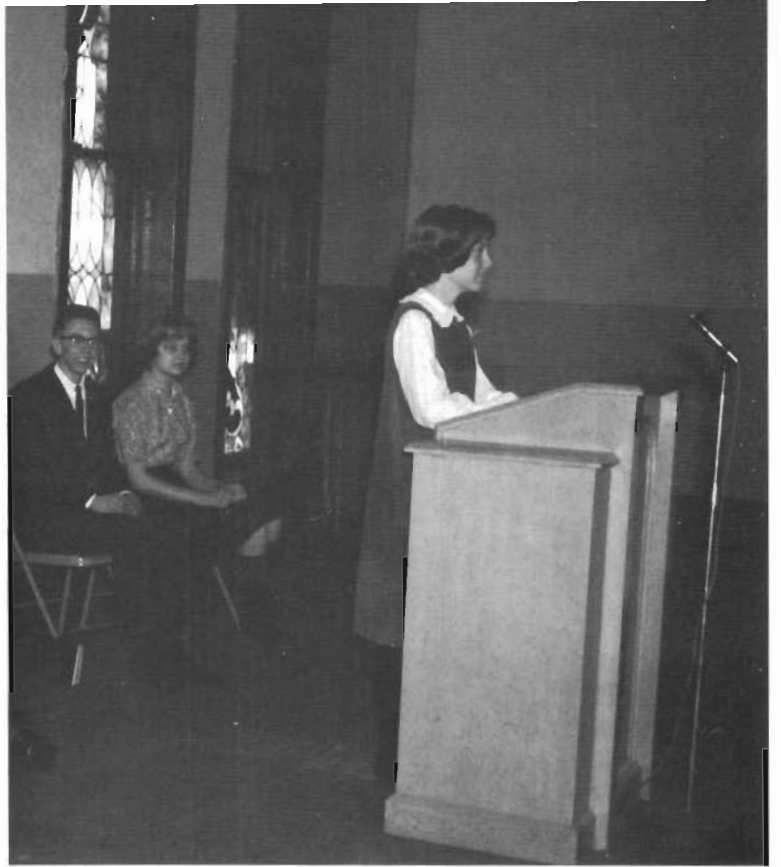
## Maplewood Has First

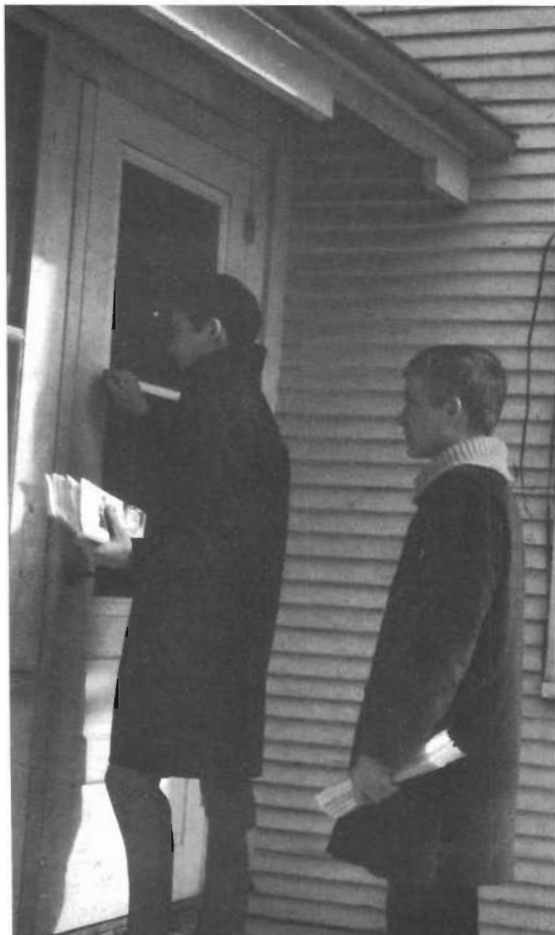

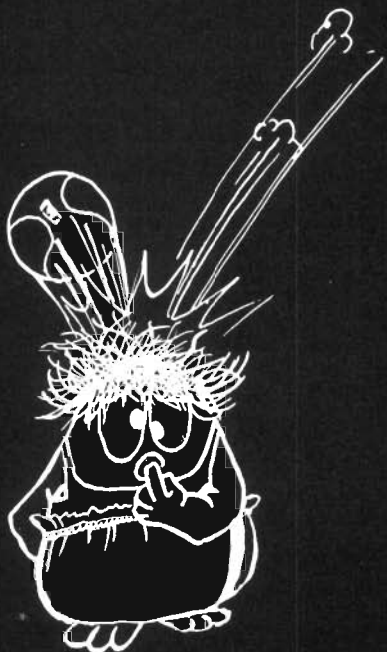

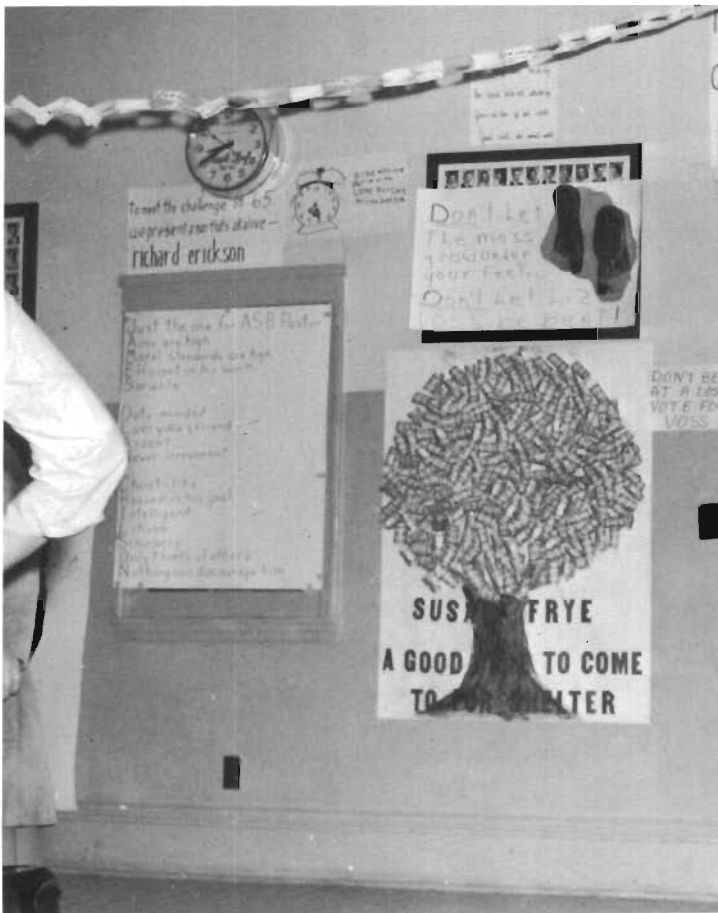

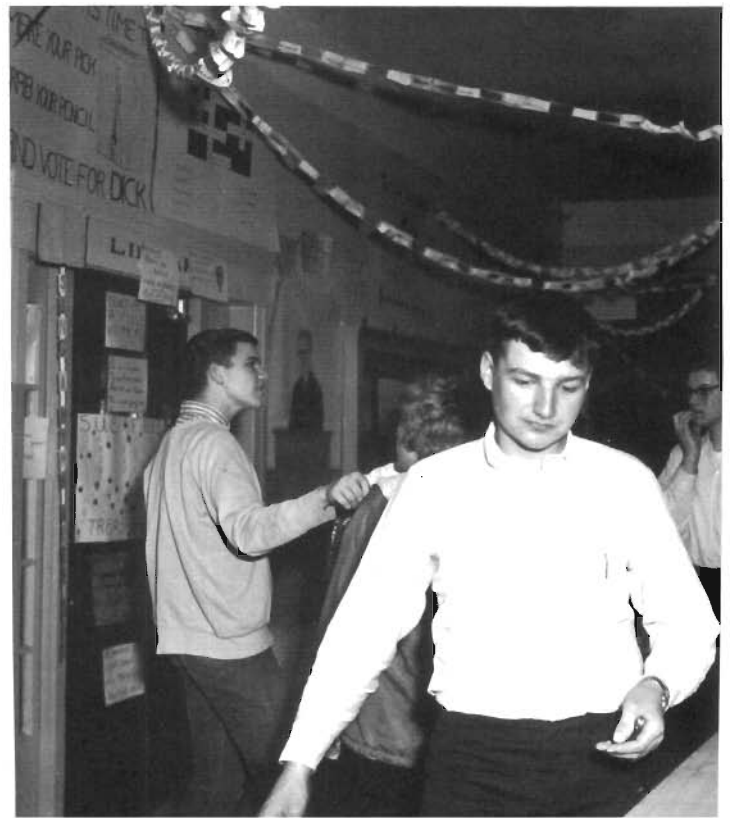

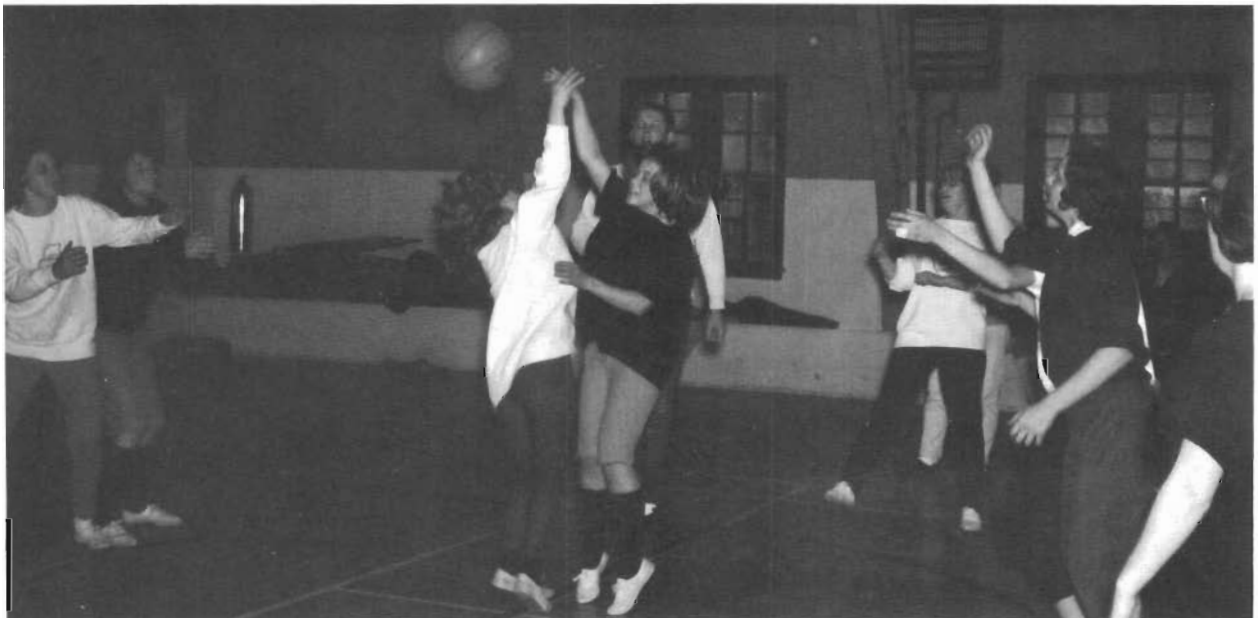

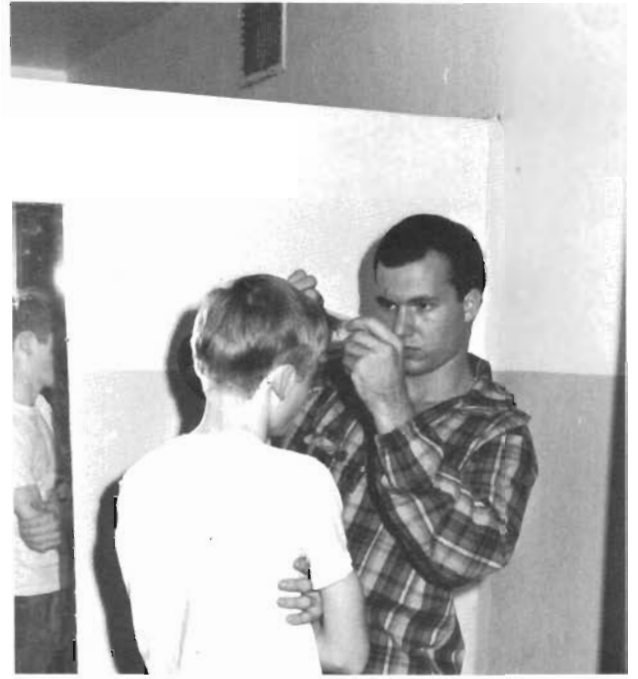

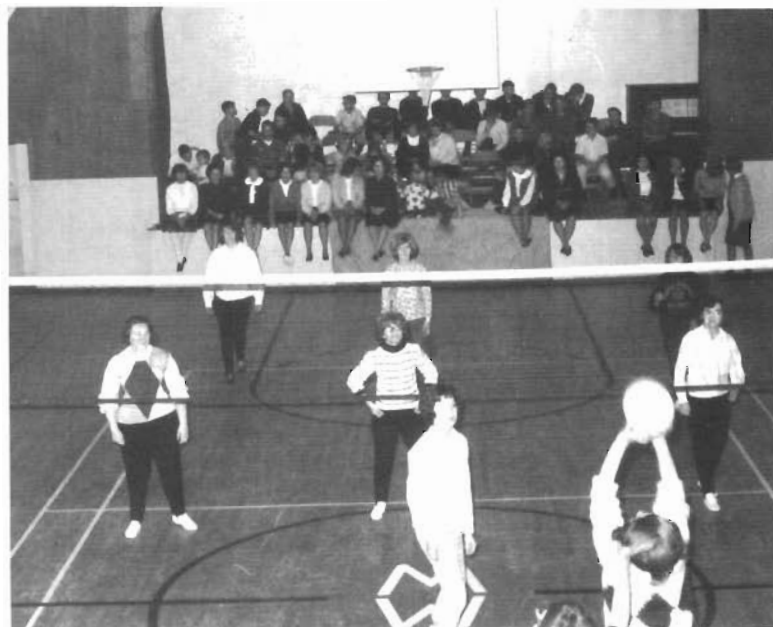

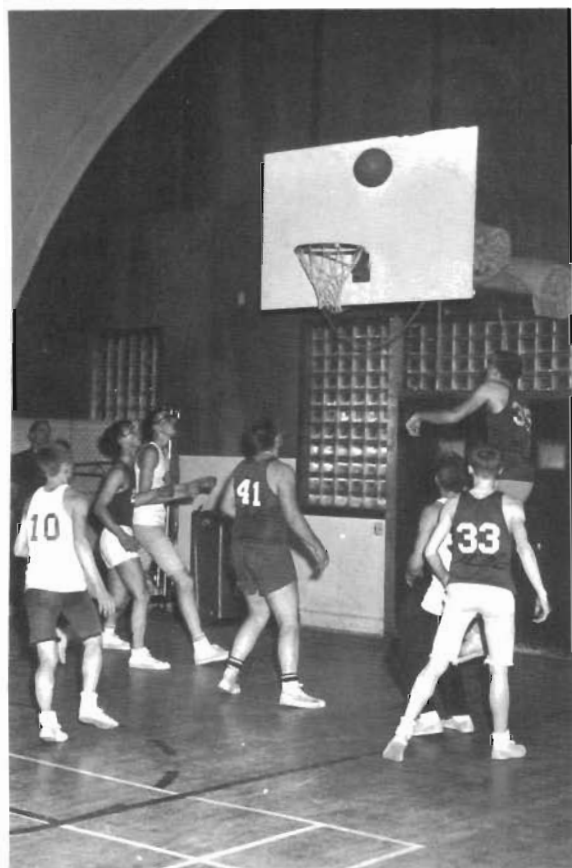




# Provide for All

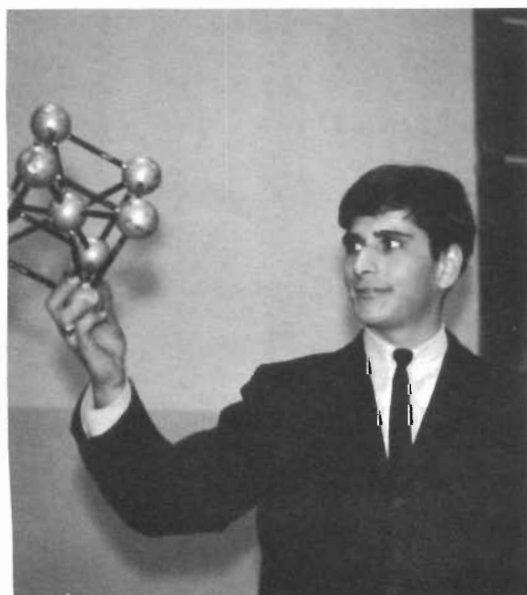

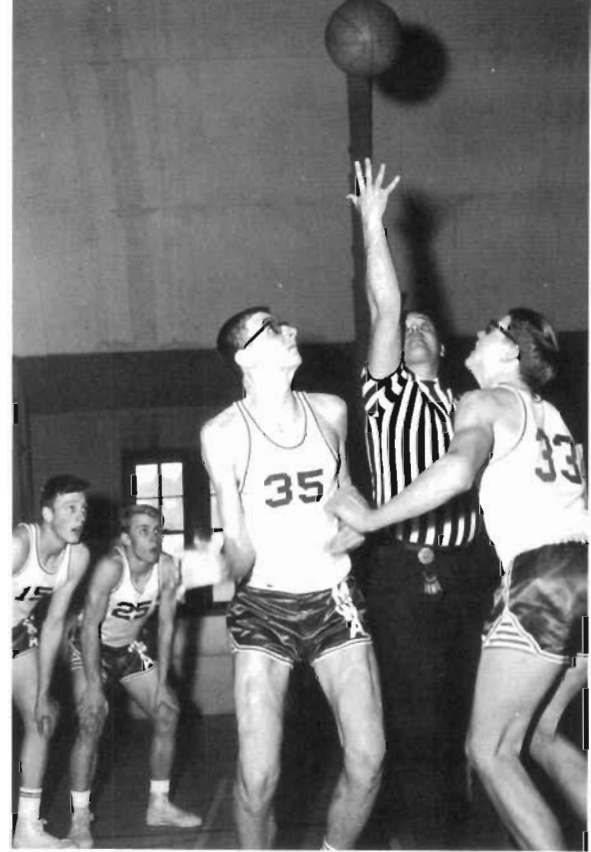

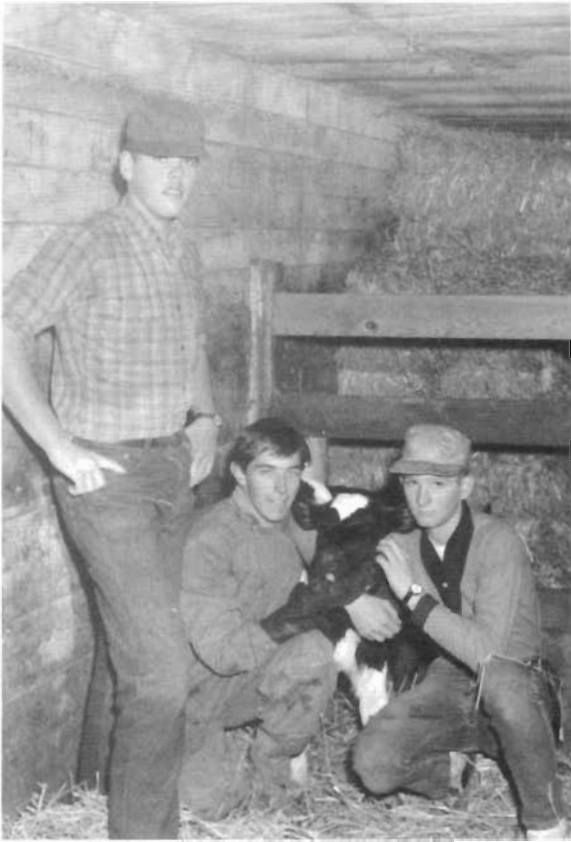

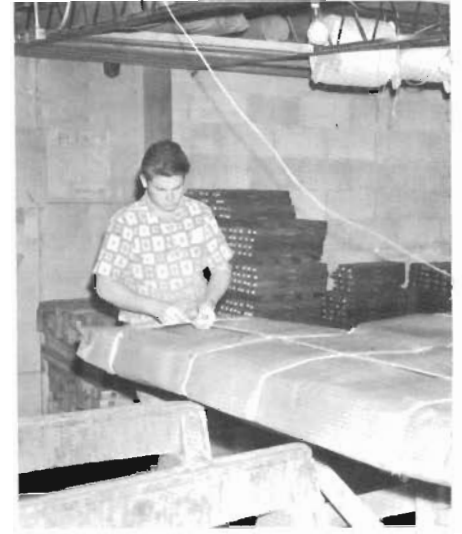

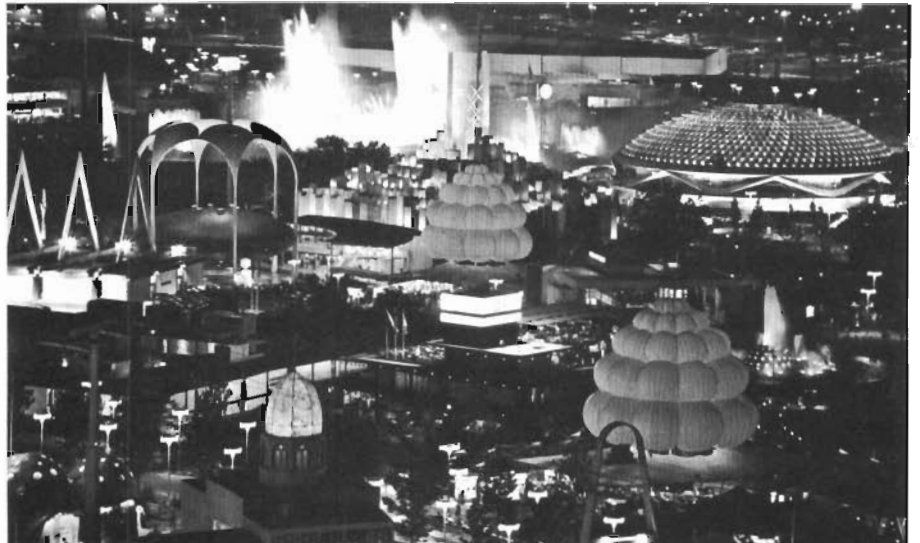
