50th Anniversary and Alumni Homecoming To Be Held May 2

Ethel Marie Hartzell was born in Montevideo, Minnesota, on May 19, 1898. She was the eldest of a family of seven and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Olaf Hartzell of Mon-tevideo, survive her, together with three sisters and three brothers: Ralph. Sylvia and Lawrence of Ralph, Sylvia, and Lawrence of Montevideo, Alvin of Morgan, Mrs. Jeanette Cressy of Minneapolis, and Mrs. Pearl Lindh of Liberal, Kansas. Also surviving, in the im-mediate family, are seven nieces and nephews.

When a small child, Ethel was stricken with spinal meningitis, which, together with a heart condition, kept her in frail health from early childhood and interrupted her grade, high school, and college work many times. In spite of fre-quent illness and limited strength, Ethel attended grade school and began her high school work in the public schools of Montevideo. In 1925 she enrolled in Maplewood Academy in Hutchinson (then known as the Hutchinson Theolo-(then gical Seminary) and here she fin-ished her high school education, graduating as valedictorian of her class. After graduation from high school, she attended Union College in Lincoln, Nebraska, from which she received her B.A. degree in 1941. That year she was listed among ten other graduates of Union in the "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities."

Miss Hartzell affiliated with the Seventh-day Adventist church in Montevideo in 1918, and, at the time of her death, had been a member of the Maplewood faculty for many years. She had, also, in the past summers, assisted in the summer youth camps, having charge of arts and crafts and nature study programs. Art, poetry, and the study of nature, especially birds, were her special interests, which she loved to share with others. From early youth, she showed marked talent in drawing, painting, and design. Her aptitude for teach-ing art was also clearly indicated, and her Maplewood art students through the years number many hundreds, some of whom have tak-en up art as their vocation. She was also a writer of verse and had recently written for the **Youth's** Instructor.

Active in the work of the school she loved so much, she passed away in Hutchinson on Thursday morning, April 8, after a short illness. Services were held in the Maplewood chapel on Sunday, April

Our esteem is unbounded for the enthusiasm, courage, and inspiration she displayed regarding the wel-fare of those about her. Her own true sterling Christian life will live on in the memory of those who knew and loved her.

We all realize that the ways of God with man are not to be questioned, and though we may not understand now, in the coming years such dark things will be made plain.
