

They are truth, the breastplate of righteousness, the gospel of Jesus Christ, the shield of faith, the sword of the spirit, and the helmet of salvation. In the 11:00 o'clock service on Sabbath, Elder Soper told us what to do with temptation. "Remember," he said, "It is no sin to be tempted but it is a sin to yield to temptation."

IS IT WORTH IT?

In this day of inflated costs on everything we buy, the question is often asked, "Is it worth it?" It seems that today everything must have a monetary value of some sort placed

This same question has probably been asked by many parents and students when they figure the cost of attending

one of our Christian schools in dollars and cents.

During the 1953-1954 school year, parents and students paid in cash and labor \$95,716.24 for Christian education at Maplewood. The average dormitory enrollment for the above year was 115 students. This makes a cost of \$828.31 per pupil per year. Is it worth it? Can we place a monetary value on Christian education, Christian association, church membership? It takes years to see the end results of Christian education.

Our church records bring out the fact that of those who attend our schools only 15% leave the church; whereas, of those who attend the schools of the world 85% leave the church. I ask you, "Does Christian education pay? Is it worth it?" Look at the above percentage and decide for yourself.
