Foreword






Many activities are planned for the social side of our school life. The students eagerly anticipate those special evenings when they all dress in formals or suits for a banquet or other special entertainment for the evening.


Opening doors for the girls is one aspect of courtesy looked for in students when being considered to hold the title of "Courtesy King or Queen" for the month.




MR. CECIL CONQUEST Spanish I and II







Medical Cadet Corps

The Medical Cadet Corps is designed to train young men for service in the medical units of the Armed Forces during the term of their military service. Under the able direction of Lt. Hinde, the cadets learn to march and follow military commands, apply the principles of First Aid, understand the organization of the military services, and practice military courtesy. To help the trainees apply this new knowledge under realistic conditions, they were taken to North Star Camp near Brainerd for a week-end bivouac from October 19 to 22. There they pitched their tents, hiked, stood guard, took their turn at K. P. duty, and participated in other army-type activities. Military service is not an unexpected or unwelcome tour of duty to the young man who has been thus trained in a Medical Cadet Corps unit.
